## Four Intersectionals With Big 10 Teams Due

PULLMAN, Wash. (UPI) — Washington State center Tom Erlandson was still a doubtful starter today for Saturday night's game against Texas in Austin.

Erlandson worked out in sweat clothes during Tuesday's tough 90-minute drill on fundamentals, but the team trainer was uncertain about the senior lineman's physical status for the Longhorns' contest. Cougar coach Jim Sutherland also put his first three units up against simulated Texas offensive and defensive patterns.

### Ducks Expect Battle

EUGENE, Ore. (UPI) — The Oregon Ducks were looking forward today to a rugged defensive battle Saturday against the Minnesota Gophers, and coach Len Casanova was expected to make the remaining workouts this week equally rugged.

Halfback Mel Renfro will miss the game in Minneapolis and probably be out of action for about one month because of his chipped instep bone. Oregon coaches said Tuesday Lu Bain would probably take over for Renfro.

### Bruins Passing

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — UCLA's Bobby Smith, the Bruins' top tailback, and sophomore Mike Haffner both worked hard on their passes Tuesday as the team prepared to loosen up Ohio State's defense on Saturday in Columbus.

Coach Bill Barnes scheduled the lengthy passing practice following the Bruins' poor aerial game with Michigan last week.

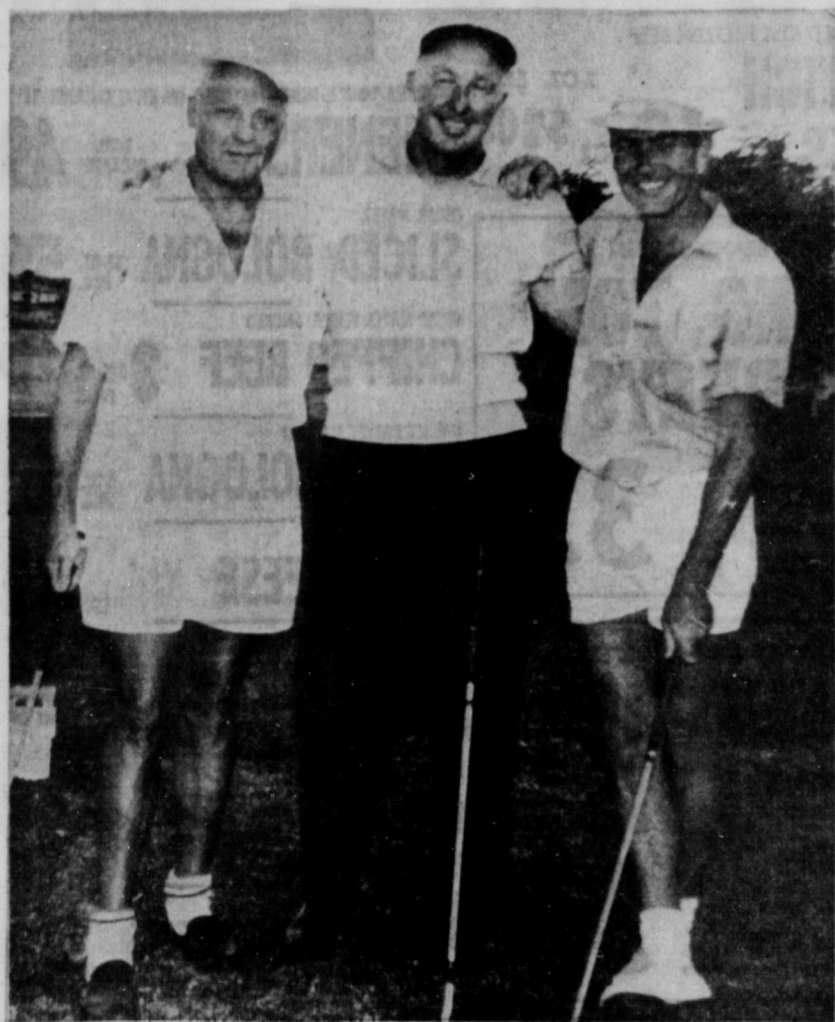
Barnes said starting left tackle Tony Fiorentino would probably miss action against the Buckeyes because of his injured knee. Steve Bauwens is expected to start in his place.

## YANKS BATTLE REDS IN NON-NUCLEAR FIGHT

NEW YORK (UPI) — World Series notes:

This is the series that matches the Reds against the Yanks. But the Soviet news agency, Tass, will not cover the games.

"It would be completely baffling to the Soviet people," said a news editor at the Tass New York office. "But, come to think of it, if the Reds win, maybe we'll pick it up from the papers."

Vignettes: Mickey Mantle in the Yankee locker room with a bandage on his right rear, so big it looked as if he had slid into third base and it stuck to him. . . . Roger Maris cleaning out his locker, perhaps in expectation he won't be coming back to New York again this year. Among the things he packed — a baseball for his kids with the autograph, "Mickey Mantle" . . . A New York columnist's description of National League President Ford Frick: "He wore an asterisk in his lapel."

First in line for the bleacher seats, Ralph Belcore of Chicago, who has been sitting on the sidewalk since Thursday. Belcore has been entering first-in-line contests since 1940. He picks the Yanks today, 4-2. . . . Biggest bettor here?

Probably Harold S. Smith, operator of Harold's Club in Reno, the country's biggest gambling emporium. Smith, who once bet \$152,000 on a single roll of the dice — and lost — says he will bet "pretty good" on the series but won't say how he is laying his money.

The Cincinnati team, staying at the Hotel Roosevelt, lost in the lobby crowd of delegates to the 11th constitutional convention of the New York Subway Workers Union. . . . Terrible-tempered Freddie Hutchinson, the Red manager, one of the most agreeable men in the crowd. When he pitched in the American League, other clubs following his team into visitors' locker rooms could tell whether Hutch had won or lost by whether the furniture was intact. . . . The Yankees so blasé about winning their 26th pennant they turned down Mayor Robert Wagner's offer of a ticker tape parade.

Joe DiMaggio throwing out the first ball today. . . . Guy Lombardo's orchestra furnishing the pregame music. . . . 19-year-old Sal Durante, who caught Maris' 61st homer last week in the bleachers, to see the Yankee games free in the box seats with his girl. . . . Color TV sets standing in Grand Central Station for the passing crowds to watch the games.

HESPERIA, Calif. (UPI) — Jack Fleck, winner of last weekend's Bakersfield Open, and Bob Rosburg, the runnerup, have entered the \$12,500 Hesperia Invitational Golf Tournament. It was announced today.

Fleck, the man who beat Ben Hogan for the U.S. Open title in a playoff in 1955, pulled the same sort of a stunt on Rosburg last Sunday when they were tied at the end of 72 holes.

George Bayer and Jon Gustin who tied for fourth at Bakersfield will be on hand for the two-day golf festival at this desert resort on the weekend.

A pro-celebrity 18-hole event will be held Saturday with competitors from the entertainment world such as Rock Hudson, Dale Robertson, Vic Damone, and Jim Davis.

On Sunday the pros go it alone in a 36-hole event.

## ANNUAL GOLFING CHALLENGE STARTS FRIDAY ON DESERT

YUCCA VALLEY — The limit of entries is nearly complete for the third annual Pioneer Pass Golf Challenge. The golfing event, featuring the 28-mile "World's Longest and Only 19th Hole" connecting the Hi-Desert of Yucca Valley with the mountain country of Bear Valley, will start Friday and be completed Saturday.

The two days will be crammed with exciting and festive occasions including a 19th Tee Kickoff Dinner, a 19th Hole Buffet, a Victory Dinner and the climaxing 19th Hole Trophy Party.

To keep the PPGC moving at a brisk clip along the Pioneer Pass road between Yucca Valley and Big Bear Lake the famed amateur radio SOCAL 6 Net from Los Angeles with 10 mobile units each day will handle all communications along the hazardous mountain and canyon fairway.

Many Volunteers Participating will be 30 Marines acting as "spotters" for players who this year are limited to 30. Another 30 judges will accompany the players to see that score cards are official. A check wagon will keep the hungry gallery and contestants supplied with coffee and sandwiches.

At 7:30 Friday evening the Kick-off Dinner moves into gear at Callahan's in Yucca Valley. Master of ceremonies will be Al Fisher, president of PPGC. Color slides of the 19th Hole will be featured with dancing to follow.

On Saturday morning, the Glen Restaurant will open doors at 5:45 a.m. for "ham 'n eggs" to get contestants, spotters and judges started off on the 19th Hole golfing trail. Play gets under way at 7 a.m. with tee off at the Yucca Valley Country Club for nine holes of regulation golf.

By 9 a.m. the first player is scheduled to face the 19th Hole tee at the west end of Mane St. in Pioneertown and take off for Big Bear.

First day's play will probably terminate somewhere between the famous Rose Mine at the end of Rattlesnake Canyon, and the Par 2 Hole at the Arrastre Creek check point. Entertainment and dancing will be provided throughout the evening at the Golden Station, the Red Dog, Callahan's, the Sky Room and the Glen.

19th Hole Finale On Sunday play will resume where it left off. At the Peter Pan Lodge in Big Bear City, where the 19th Hole cup is located, a sumptuous Buffet will await the arrival of the weary golfers from across Baldwin Lake. Mobile unit of SOCAL 6 Net will broadcast up to the minute scores.

With all players holed out at Peter Pan, the contestants and gallery finish the Challenge with nine holes of regulation play at the Moonridge Golf course at Big Bear Lake. Following this the evening's PPGC Victory events get under way.

The Victory Dinner will be at 6:30 at the Moonridge Club house and at Snow Summit Lodge where the presentation of Trophies will take place at 9 p.m. followed by dancing, singing and the telling of the "tallest 19th Hole tale." Reservations to all events may be made by contacting Callahan's at Yucca Valley, and either Moonridge Country Club or Snow Summit Lodge in Big Bear Lake.
