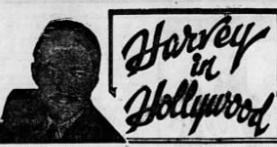

George W. Brown, editor of the Lawrence Herald of Freedom, explained "Sound on the Goose" in the issue of July 11, 1937.

"We understand that it was a sort of catchword among the Proslavery section about the border in Missouri, as early as the summer of 1834, and that it has subsequently extended itself very generally into the Southern States, and was used as the shibboleth of the party in endorsing those known to be 'right' with them on the slavery question. He is some 'handed' good, or 'He is right on the goose' is a passage which any other person to all the secrecy of which the other was captain. McGee, at Kansas City, had his inscribed on his back hanging to his hotel, so to speak the world where the proprietor could be found."
